

Understanding Menopause Terminology



Menopause: Diagnosed after 12 consecutive months without periods (average age ~51).

12 months + 1 day = considered to have reached menopause




Early Menopause: used to describe menopause before the age of (45).




Premature Ovarian Insufficiency (POI): When ovaries stop functioning normally before age 40 (sometimes as early as teens/20s). Unlike natural menopause, POI can be sporadic or reversible.



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Chemical Menopause: Induced by medications (e.g., chemotherapy, hormone-blocking for cancer). Symptoms may improve after treatment ends.



Surgical Menopause: Happens when both ovaries are removed, leading to immediate drop in hormone levels. Often to manage ovarian cancer risk, endometriosis or ovarian cycts.

SOS! No two menopause experiences are the same! The cause affects timing, symptoms, and impact!
